

Playing on the Teeter Totter



Mushiba: We are in this life to bring balance to the issues we have selected for the learning of our lessons. Waith uses the teeter totter as a lighthearted symbol of balancing those lessons. In the excerpt from *Playtime on the Earth Plane*, Waith discusses why an energy leaves The One and comes on the earth plane to play:

Waith: *“Life on the earth plane is a life of imbalance. All who are out of The One are in a constant state of imbalance. That is what makes it exciting. When things are on an even keel, it is boring ~ to not have anything going on, no disruptions, without any issues being presented. You come out of The One because it is boring ~ you want to have fun, so you come out of The One.*

“You work, then, to regain the balance between seriousness and lightheartedness until it is time to return into The One ~ be absorbed, get bored and come back out. For example, often an entity comes into an incarnation to be very serious ~ the mission is to be at one end of the teeter totter and serious for the entire lifetime.

“You will encounter many entities who are at different points in their balancing of Lightness and seriousness. Be cautious of allowing another entity to interfere with your own sense of balancing. Do not let another impose upon you ~ just as you do not impose upon another.”

As a child, I loved the teeter totter and the fun with trying to balance with various friends to bring equilibrium ~ and once we did, by adding any number of items, it became boring. We would leave the teeter totter and find something else in the playground. Days ~ weeks ~ months ~ we would return to the teeter totter and repeat, hoping to use fewer items to bring the balance.
